

#### **ROADSIDE MOWING**

Roadside mowing will be contracted out. Anyone having small trees and shrubs should have them well marked as the Municipality will not be responsible for any damage. Owners of vacant lots are advised that it is their responsibility to maintain weeds and excess grass under the Property Standards Act.

#### **LANDFILL**

For larger amounts such as a garage clean out or house renovations, refuse can be taken to the former landfill site but must be separated amongst the various recycle bins and non recyclables. The cost is dependant on weight but the minimum is \$20. Additional fees apply for larger items like furniture and mattresses. Hazardous wastes are still accepted at the site.

#### SPRING AND FALL LEAF PICK-UP

The spring pick-up will be held during the last week in April and the first week in May. The fall pick-up will begin at the start of October to mid-November, weather permitting. Leaves must be in brown paper bags which are available at the Municipal Office. Two bundles per household only. If you require more they can be purchased at the local hardware store. Brush must be tied in bundles no longer than 4 feet, and cannot weigh more than 50 pounds. For those who wish to take their own leaves and compost, the drop off site is at 40131 Hydro Line Road – just east of the Cemetery. Open 7 days a week Mon-Fri 7:30am-5:00pm, Sat, ACCEPTABLE ONLY: Sun 10:00am-4:00pm. Leaves, brush, grass clippings and kitchen compost. NOT ACCEPTABLE: plastics, plastic containers, metal, lumber, cement, tires, appliances and garbage. This is a free service that should not be abused.





# Home Emergency Survival Kit

#### **Supplies for Your Family for 72 Hours**

- Non-perishable food items.
   Canned food such as soups, stews, baked beans, pasta, meat, fish, fruit. Crackers and biscuits, honey, peanut butter, jam
- Manual can opener (bottle opener)
- Bottled water. 4L per person per day. (2 for drinking & 2 for hygiene and washing)
- Crank or battery operated radio
- · Flashlight with batteries
- Candles and matches (lighter)
- · Family First Aid kit
- Personal hygiene items (toilet paper, feminine products, hand sanitizer, etc.)
- Pocket knife or multi-tool
- Whistle
- Cash (small bills and change)
- Special needs items for babies, pets, elderly (as required)
- · Garbage bags and zip-lock bags
- Duct tape
- Copies of important papers (insurance, medications, family contacts, etc.)
- Emergency document holder
- Spare phone or tablet charger

**NOTE:** Consume and replace water and canned goods annually



#### **STOP All Activities**

Immediately seek shelter in a substantial building or hard topped vehicle. Wait 30 minutes after the last rumble of thunder to resume activities

# **Be Weather Aware!**

When planning your daily activities its important to be prepared for severe weather. Summer weather has a tendency to be more volatile than other seasons. It can be less predictable, with less lead time for preparedness. It's always a better idea to plan ahead.

# Tips on Preparing for Severe Weather

- Don't wait for a storm to hit. Begin preparing now and you'll be able to react quickly when a storm arrives. Make sure your Home Emergency Survival Kit is stocked, ready and in a place where you can easily access it.
- Pay close attention to the weather. Some types of nasty summer weather can develop quickly with little warning, so be sure to regularly check the forecast on trusted sources including radio, smartphone apps, or the internet.
- 3. Respect the potentially destructive power or weather. When severe weather is forecast, keep a close eye on the sky and be prepared to take cover if threatening weather approaches. Stay inside until conditions have calmed and the danger has passed. This is no time for recreational weather watching or taking photos or video to post on social media.
- 4. Remember that after-storm conditions can also pose a hazard. After a severe storm has passed use special care when you leave your shelter. There may be downed electrical wires, broken trees and dangerous debris around your property and in the streets. Be extremely cautious if you decide to tackle tree removal by yourself. Better yet, leave it to the professionals.

## **Tornado**

Tornadoes are rotating columns of high-velocity wind that can bring devastation to anything in their path. Ontario averages 12 tornadoes per year, most occurring in June, July and August, although the season extends from April to September.

# When a Tornado Threatens

- Take shelter immediately, away from doors, windows or exterior walls. The basement of a sturdy building is best.
- Don't get caught in a vehicle or mobile home. If no other shelter is available then lie flat in a ditch, ravine or low-lying area.
- Beware of flying debris. Even small objects such as sticks and straw can become lethal missiles.



# **ROADS DEPARTMENT**



#### **Parking**

There is NO overnight parking on any streets or in parking lots from November 15 to April 15 of each year within the Municipality. Prior to that, there is parking permitted on certain streets, one should check with municipal by-laws for those streets.

#### 911 Signs

Property owners are responsible for notifying the Municipality of Central Huron if your 5 digit number has been damaged or stolen. Those that would like to get a new sign with their name on it are asked to contact a sign shop that makes them.

#### Street Lighting

The Municipality has street lights in many of the small hamlets as well as in town. Anyone noticing that a street light doesn't work are asked to call the Municipality at 519-482-3997 to report it. There is a 4 digit number on each pole that is the identification number for that light. Please have that number ready when you call.

#### Landowners

Mud on the road is dangerous & more slippery than ice. Please ensure our rural roads are kept clean and safe. A person who deposits mud onto the roadway may be liable if an accident were to occur.

#### Sidewalks

Please refrain from placing garbage and recycling bins or other objects on sidewalks. This restricts snow removal and hinders accessibility.

#### **Snow Moving**

Pushing snow to the other side of the road when cleaning out your laneway is prohibited. There is a by-law in place that prohibits this practice

#### **Compost site**

The Municipality of Central Huron has a compost site at 40131 Hydro Line Rd. It is a drop off spot for leaves, brush, garden waste, as well as household kitchen scraps. Items can be dropped off at your leisure. A limited number of paper bags are available for pickup at the town hall. This is not a drop off for construction materials, unwanted fill, cement blocks, plastic bags, flowers still in pots etc., as this material should go to the landfill. This is a free service for Central Huron residents that should not be abused.

#### **Sump Pumps – Make the right connection!**


A sump pump is a pump that is used to protect a basement from flooding and general moisture intrusion by removing rainwater that infiltrates into the soil around the basement foundation.

The sump pit appears as a hole in the basement floor and is usually either a plastic or concrete container buried into the ground so it can collect water from the foundation drain.

When water reaches sump float switch it activates your sump pump. Water from the sump pit is then pumped out and discharged through a pipe in the wall to an outside location far enough from the foundation wall to prevent the discharged water from re-entering your foundation drain. The water is then naturally absorbed into the ground. If there is a storm sewer connection then the sump pit discharge pipe may be directly connected to the storm system.



#### Not All Connections are good!



In some homes, sump pumps do not pump the water outside. Instead, they are connected into the sanitary sewer system. these types of connections are in violation of the ontario Building Code and the Municipality of Central Huron's Sewer Use By-Law 39-2018. As well as a sump pump connection to the sanitary sewer can cause a back-up which will lead to flooding your basement with sewage! It is also detrimental to the operations at the Clinton Sewage t reatment Plant.

Please make the right connection to protect your home and the municipal sanitary sewer system.

Do's	Don'ts
Do have your downspouts extended far away from your house	Don't have your downspouts connected to your foundation drain
Do have your sump pump discharge outside away from your foundation	Don't have your sump pump discharge to the floor drain or laundry tub (these are connected to the sanitary sewer)
Do have your sump pump discharge to the storm connection if one is available	Don't discharge your sump pump to a neighbouring property
Do protect your discharge hose from freezing in the winter.	Don't discharge your sump pump to the sidewalk or roadway
Do have a back-up battery on your sump pump in the case of a power failure

The Clinton Public Hospital Foundation is a charitable organization, committed to the advancement of healthcare and the well-being of those served by the Clinton Public Hospital, through the raising, managing and distribution of funds for equipment and infrastructure to our hospital. The Foundation consists of a volunteer board of directors and one part-time employee, who work together towards our mission to support the purchase of capital equipment and upgrades to the infrastructure of our hospital, which is not otherwise funded.

Financial donations to the Clinton Public Hospital Foundation are welcomed and appreciated at any time, as there is always a need for private funding to reinforce the existing strengths of our hospital and to keep pace with future medical technology. Any donation, large or small, will make a difference for Clinton Public Hospital and the healthcare of our local, rural community.

Additional projects supported through this disbursement include an eye trauma slit lamp, EGC machine with trolley and cart, 15 single channel IV pumps, a portable ultrasound unit, microsoft surfaces, charging stations, five isolation towers, and COVID-19 response equipment (negative air pressure machine, portable pressure monitor, ante room panel kit, tablet for screening/audits, protective screens for communication stations, workstations on wheels and vital signs towers).

For the 2021-2022 fiscal year, the Clinton Public Hospital Foundation Board of Directors has committed to disbursing \$465,000 to Clinton Public Hospital in support of recliner chairs for palliative room, a lift-recline chair and coffee tables for the in-patient lounge, a smart TV for the ED waiting room, two cardiac monitors, nine patient beds, two automatic despensing cabinets, a bladder scanner, and two bariatric stretchers.



#### Making Moments Matter in Central Huron

Compassionate care at the end of life is essential care in Huron County. For over 25 years, Huron Hospice has provided comfort, care and support to people who are at the end of life. Hospice volunteers are an important part of the circle of care which is provided in home, hospice residence, hospital, and long-term care settings. Since 2018 hospice care has been available in the hospice residence setting. By the end of 2021, 140 families accessed this essential end of life care at the hospice residence and 400 people received palliative care in their own homes or long-term care or in hospital. Today, Huron Hospice has become a centre of stability in Huron County.

In your Home - A dedicated team of volunteers are part of the circle of care providing companionship, listening and emotional support to people who are at the end of life. They offer respite for caregivers to take time away or rest. Our volunteers have respect for the privacy, dignity and self-determination of the person.

In Our Residence - Our four-bed hospice offers 24/7 care by nursing staff trained in end of life care. Care is provided as it would be in your own home. Our home includes private rooms with space for visiting family, a large living room to congregate, and a spacious kitchen to enjoy meals with family and friends.

Grief & Bereavement - There are many reasons for grief: the loss of a loved one, the loss of health, loss of a job or marriage or the letting go of a long-held dream. Dealing with a significant loss can be one of the most difficult times in a person's life. Dedicated staff and volunteer teams works one-on-one to help people to acknowledge loss. Grief groups are available.

#### **BullDinG DEPARTMENT**

#### LOCATED AT THE BACK OF THE MUNICIPAL OFFICE



The Primary Role of the Building Department is to promote public safety and assist development in compliance with all applicable laws.

The Building Department is a multi-faceted department with its major roles including enforcement of the Ontario Building Code, Municipal by-laws, property standards, zoning administration and source water protection. The building department also oversees septic and plumbing permits and the required inspeciton services. These roles ensure compatibility and protection of adjacent land uses, maintenance and sustainability of properties and the quality of life for Central Huron residents and visitors.

#### **BUILDING PERMITS**

A building Permit is your formal permission to begin construction or demolition. It means that the Municipality of Central Huron has approved plans for a new structure, an addition, an alteration, a renovation or change of use of a structure.

Contact the Municipality of Central Huron if you are unsure whether you require a permit for your project. Even though your project may not require a building permit, you must still comply with the requirements of the Zoning By-Law and any other applicable laws. It is the property owner's responsibility to ensure that a Building Permit is obtained prior to any work starting, when required.

Approved Building Permit plans must comply with

the Ontario Building Code, local zoning by-laws and other applicable laws. Building permits regulate the type or use of a structure allowed within the community and ensures that building standards are met. The building permit process protects each property owner's interests, as well as the community at large and provides for the erection of safe, legal and sound structures.

#### WHEN DO I NEED A BUILDING PERMIT?

All new buildings, prefabricated buildings and accessory buildings over 10 square metres require a permit. Repairs, alterations, renovations and additions to existing buildings need a permit.

Swimming pools, sewage systems, plumbing alterations, mobile homes, temporary tents and structures need one as well. Demolitions also require a permit.

#### **HOW DO I GET A BUILDING PERMIT?**

Applications are available at the town hall or on the Central Huron website.

Submit your completed application and applicable drawings to the building department. They will be reviewed by the Chief Building Official and a permit issued if your plans comply with building regulations. You will need to set up building inspections as per the instructions on your permit.

As originally planned, Albert Street will get the top coat of asphalt in the spring. This scheduling allows for settling to happen over the winter. Then if there are any fixes needed, they can be done prior to the top coat being installed, rather than cutting through a completed new street.

Due to weather, it was decided to finish the Cenotaph Park in the spring.



### **AUBURN DOG PARK**

The Auburn Dog Park is located behind the ball diamond. There is a laneway and parking area south of the diamond off Hardwood Line, so you can now drive quite close to the gates. The laneway is not accessible in winter, but the dog park gates are kept open throughout the year. You can walk or snow shoe in through the ball diamond. It is accessible in daylight hours only.

We have a small dog section and large dog section, both of which are fully fenced. There are picnic tables in both sections of the park, so bring a book and enjoy the day! Be sure to follow current COVID protocol. Please stoop and scoop and keep our dog park clean. There is a garbage can and doggy bags for waste. Please bring your own water for your pet.

Dog treats, leashes and toys are available for purchase at the Auburn Huron Bay Farm Supply.

The Municipality of Central Huron Clerk's Department issues marriage licenses.


- Marriage Licenses are issued at the Municipal Office, 23 Albert St. Clinton during office hours from 8:30 am to 4:30 pm, Monday to Friday. The current fee for a marriage license is \$100.00.
- At least one applicant to the proposed marriage must apply in person; however the completed Marriage License Application must be signed and dated by both applicants.
- 2 valid pieces of I.D. are required for both parties. One of which, must be, either a current Passport or Birth Certificate. The second piece of Identification may be either a valid Driver's License or Photo Health Card.
- A Marriage License is valid in Ontario only for a period of 90 days from the date of issuance.




